- **School for Murder** by Robert Barnard – *a murderous comedy of manners set in a private boys' day school*
- **Worm of Death** by Nicolas Blake – *a wonderfully witty satire of academic life, as well as an intriguing mystery*
- **The Student Body** by J.S. Borthwick – *a murder mystery set at Maine's Bowmouth College*
- **The Moving Toyshop** by Edmund Crispin – *a wonderful classic mystery, featuring Gervase Fen, a Professor of English Language and Literature at Oxford*
- **Death in a Tenured Position** by Amanda Cross – *academics among us might enjoy this ironic look at their world.*
- **Well-Schooled in Murder** by Elizabeth George – *Inspector Thomas Lynley and Detective Sergeant Barbara Havers uncover unsuspected evil at a prestigious public school. As seen on "Mystery!" on PBS.*
- **Book** by Robert Grudin – *another satirical look at the hallowed halls of the academic world*
- **Tuesday the Rabbi Saw Red** by Harry Kemelman – *one of the enjoyable series of books featuring Rabbi David Small. In this one, the action takes place in a college setting.*
- **Graves in Academe** by Susan Kenney – *an English course syllabus parallels a series of murders. A delight for those who enjoy literary humor.*
- **In the Dead of Summer** by Gillian Roberts – *the action takes place at a Philadelphia prep school. One of a series of novels featuring English teacher Amanda Pepper.*
- **Gaudy Night** by Dorothy Sayers – *an absolute must in the list of academic whodunits, this classic features the inimitable Lord Peter Wimsey and some deadly doings at Oxford.*

- **Miss Pym Disposes** by Josephine Tey – *another classic from this master of the genre, which takes an author of a psychology textbook to a girls' boarding school, where she discovers that all is not as it seems.*
